Caring Dads	
Overview	 Caring Dads supports better parenting practices and a reduction in violence to enhance the safety and wellbeing of children It seeks to develop fathers' ability to engage in respectful, non-abusive parenting with the mothers of their children The programme recognises the importance of making fathers equally accountable for their behaviour and for their children's wellbeing — a role that is often assigned to women as protectors of their children
Programme goals	 To develop sufficient trust and motivation to engage men in the process of examining their fathering To increase fathers' awareness and application of child-centred fathering To increase fathers' awareness of, and responsibility for, abusive and neglectful fathering and the impact of this on their children To rebuild trust with children and plan for the future
Upcoming programme dates	Ongoing
Eligibility criteria	 Many fathers are likely to benefit from participation in this program, but especially men whose relationship with their children or children's mothers is problematic This may include over-controlling, over-involved, distant and/or irresponsible, emotionally abusive fathers or fathers who have hostile, highly conflictual, or abusive relationships with the children's mothers Father must have contact with children
Exclusion criteria	 Active or imminent court proceedings regarding children Severe current or historical substance or alcohol misuse High levels of denial (non-attendance of appointments) Low risk of perpetrating behaviour Sexual abuse towards children No contact with children
Points to consider before making a referral	 Should not be mandated as part of CIN or CP plan – it is a voluntary programme It is not about ensuring families can stay together, but ensuring that dad can be a good father to their child as contain remains
What to discuss with the parent before making a referral	 It is important that informed consent is obtained prior to making a referral. It is helpful to provide a brief synopsis of the programme/intervention, how it is structured and who will be in touch to discuss next steps. Partners or Ex-Partners will be contacted in all cases.

- Caring Dads will regularly share information with other agencies, for example Social Services, CAFCASS, Contact Centres and the Police.
- We do not make assessments about child contact arrangements, but will write a report about attendance and participation on the group
